Course Overview

Portfolio

Each student will be required to create a portfolio of their observation hours during their visits to a clinic. Each visit will require a description and one picture. This will be a grade.

Grading Criteria

Tests & Class Binder- Each student will be required to maintain a class binder. All in-class and out-of-class assignments will be kept in the class binder. Tests will be administered throughout the six weeks to examine the student's knowledge of the subject matter being taught.

Projects- Projects will be assigned to reinforce what was learned in class and allow student to apply their problem-solving skills
